

# Risk Factor Types

Static: Non-changeable life factors

Dynamic: Changeable life factors

Stable: Personality characteristics, skill deficits, and learned behaviors that may be changed through intervention

Acute: Short/unstable temporal duration. Factors that can change rapidly, as a result of environmental or intra-personal conditions

# Three Generations of Risk Assessment

#### 1st Generation

Clinical Judgement

Non-Standardized

Non-Replicable

Based on experience and level of knowledge of the literature

Level of prediction little better than chance

### 2<sup>nd</sup> Generation

**Actuarial Assessment** 

Standardized

Replicable

Measures static factors empirically related to recidivism

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Generation

**Dynamic Assessment** 

Standardized

Replicable

Measures dynamic factors empirically related to recidivism

# Conscientious Effect

Completed all assessments requested

Points out need for good training

Points out need for "management buy-in"

"It works pretty well if you take it seriously"

# Generalizability

Finding from Static-99R meta-analysis

Relative risk is stable (no significant variability) across diverse samples/settings

Absolute risk varies significantly across samples

# The Static-99R Strengths



are rarely if ever challenged in evidentiary hearings in court

- Explicit scoring rules
- Relatively objective scoring instrument
- Empirically derived risk factors
- Most commonly used actuarial risk assessment for sexual offenders
- Robustly rank offenders in terms of relative risk

## The Static-99R Limitations



- Moderate Predictive Accuracy (AU .69-.70)
- Does not include all factors that predict sexual offending
- Absolute recidivism rates associated with specific risk scores vary across samples making estimates "more complex."
- Does not adequately measure general or violent recidivism
- Predicts the risk of sexual recidivism at the time of release from the index sex offense.

# General Scoring Issues



- Stick to the Coding Rules!
- Consider other assessments to capture external risk factors
- "Over-rides" not related to sexual recidivism or already considered will decrease predictive accuracy

## Eligible Offender Populations

The Static 99R is designed to assess risk of sexual recidivism for adult males who have already been charged with or convicted of at least one sex offense against a child or a non-consenting adult.







## Eligible Offender Populations



Adult Male Sexual Offenders, with at least one "Category A" offense



Male to Female Transgender until the offender has lived as a woman for at least 2 years without a penis



Juvenile offenders who committed the offense at age 17 and released at age 18 or older. Offense is adult like in nature



## Standards of Proof



### Beyond a Reasonable Doubt:

 Highest standard. It requires near certainty and is the standard necessary for criminal convictions.


### Clear and Convincing Evidence:

 Higher standard than the Balance of Probabilities, but it is not quite as high as Beyond a Reasonable Doubt.

#### **Balance of Probabilities:**

 (Preponderance of Evidence): Lowest standard. It is common in civil cases and basically means "more likely than not," or at least 51% certainty.

# Self-Report Criminal History



Self-reported information cannot be used to establish criminal history except for:

- ☑ For immigrants and refugees from third world countries
- ☑ Old out-of-state records where confirmation is not possible
- Self-reported criminal history must meet the clear and convincing threshold
- ☑ Self-report in all other cases cannot be used to establish criminal history
- ☑ Self-report can be used in Items #1, 2, 8-10.

# When to use Self-Report



- ✓ To clarify and help determine if an offense was sexually motivated. It must meet the "Clear and Convincing Evidence" rule.
- ✓ If you have charges with no information on convictions you can use self-report if you have "Clear and Convincing Evidence" that it is true.
- ✓ For the Victim Items is generally acceptable if there is a conviction or not. Use the "Balance of Probabilities" standard when scoring victim items.
- ✓ Self-report can be used on items #1, 2 and 8-10.

# Polygraph Information



Information from polygraph interviews or examinations was not used in the developmental and validation of Static-99R and should therefor not be used to score Static-99R in most cases.

#### Exclude admissions made:

- In preparation for a polygraph examination,
- During the pre-polygraph interview,
- During a post-test polygraph interview, or
- Subsequent to testing deceptive on a polygraph examination

Even if these admissions are later repeated in treatment or interviews.

Only use polygraph admissions when the information would support a new criminal investigation, essentially a confession

## Determining a Sex Offense

# Category A and B Offenses

#### Category "A" Offences

- Aggravated Sexual Assault
- Attempted sex offences (Attempted Rape, Attempted Sexual Assault)
- Compelling the commission of any sex offences (bestiality, incest, or sexual assault) or other sexual behavior (e.g., flashing on a webcam), regardless of whether it is compelled in person or via the internet
- · Conspiracy to commit a Category "A" sex offence
- . Contributing to the delinquency of a minor (where the offence had a sexual element)
- Distributing obscene materials to minors (no economic motive; presume that intent is sexual unless there is clear economic motive)
- . Counct photography (victim is parcon being photographed) for cavual purpose

### Category A Offenses

 Sexually motivated crime against an identifiable victim

- Sexual Battery
- · Sexual Communication with a Minor
- Sexual Homicide
- · Sex offences against animals (Bestiality)
- · Sex offences involving dead bodies (Offering an indignity to a dead body)
- Sodomy (includes in concert and with a minor; excludes consenting sexual activity among adults)
- Unlawful sexual intercourse with a minor (unless it falls under the category of consenting sex among similar age peers see
  page 76).
- Voyeuristic activity (Trespass by Night)

#### Category "B" Offences

- Consenting sex with other adults in public places
- Crimes relating to child pornography (possession, selling, transporting, creating where only pre-existing images or digital creation of pornography are used).
- Possession of Child Pornography (digital, child bots, written stories including those that are for the offender's own use and not shared, drawings that did not involve a live child model, avatars)
- Indecent behavior without a sexual motive (e.g., urinating in public)
- Not informing a sexual partner of HIV positive status (even if the charge/conviction indicates a Category "A" offence such as Aggravated Sexual Assault; note this is an exception in which the victim information can be used to score the victim items)
- Poluma

- ✓ No sexual motivation
- ✓ No identifiable victim
- ✓ Economic Gain

# Sexual Motivation vs. Economic Gain



### **Economic Gain:**

- Offender profits off another offender molesting a child but does not participate in the act. Economic gain only.
- Human Trafficking and Prostitution related offenses are considered crimes of economic gain and are considered Category B offenses

### <u>Sexual Motivation</u>:

- Offender asks a another offender to make a video tape while molesting a child, then keeps it for his own personal use.
- Sexually assaults a minor that he is also prostituting.
- Child pornography and sex with a minor is a Category A Sex offense.

## Is there Sexual Motivation?

To count an arrest, charge, or conviction as a sex offense, there must be sexual motivation for the offense or the sexual act was clearly part of the commission of the offense.

This may be based on self-report.

#### Non-Sexual Motivation:

- **▼** Forcible Confinement
- Breaking and Entry (Burglary) for profit
- Stalking motivated by sexual jealousy

#### **Sexual Motivation:**

☑ Offender follows a woman home breaks into her house and rapes her, and steals her jewelry. The Breaking and Entry (Burglary) and Rape are sexually motivated. The theft is for profit.

**Lewd Conduct** 

(Exposes himself to a group of children)

## **Category B:**

Lewd Conduct (Public Urination)

**Decision Point:** 

What was the motivation?

# Prison Infractions as a Sex Offense

To count a prison infraction as a sex offense the following conditions must be met:

- The behavior must be sufficiently intrusive that a charge for a sex offense would be possible were the offender not already under legal sanction
- Must be sure the sexual misbehavior actually occurred based on Clear and Convincing Evidence
- It is clear that the sanction was in response to the sexual misbehavior based on Clear and Convincing Evidence
- If the sanction was a transfer, the evaluator has to determine that the moved was to a more secure environment, not just a parallel move

### **Behavior A:**

Masturbating in his cell underneath his sheets

### **Behavior B:**

Calls over a correctional officer and purposefully exposes self

### **Decision Point:**

Could this be charged in the community?

# Community Supervision Violations as a Sex Offense

To count a community supervision violation as a sex offense the following conditions must be met:

- The behavior could have resulted in a charge/conviction for a sex offense if the offender were not already under legal sanction.
- The behavior must result in a sanction to include an arrest

### **Behavior A:**

Offender is sanctioned for looking at legal pornography involving adult actors

### **Behavior B:**

Offender is sanctioned for possessing illegal pornography after he received nude photographs of a minor

### **Decision Point:**

Could this be charged in the community?

## Consenting Sex Between Peers

Statutory Rape?

Sexting?

If the following three conditions are met, the behavior would not be considered a sex offense:

- ✓ The "alleged victim" states that the sex was cooperative
  and has never claimed otherwise
- ✓ The offender had no pre-existing power relationship (e.g., swim instructor, therapist), AND
- ✓ No more than 3 year age difference between offender and "victim" (5 years if offender is obviously of lesser cognitive developmental capacity than victim)

## Sexting



#### Category A

 If sexting is not between consenting similar aged peers and the victim is a minor (can count as a victim)

#### Category B

 If sexting was between underage peers and it was shared with other peers without consent

#### Not an offense

 Not a sexual offense if the sexts are consensual and remain solely between two underage peers (sender and receiver)

### **Sexual Threats**



#### Category A


• Credible threats against identifiable victim

### Category B

 Impersonal/generic threats where there is doubt that the threat could realistically be carried out - E.g., anonymous rape threats online

#### Not an offense

- Non-criminal behaviors that normally would not attract a criminal charge for someone not involved in the criminal justice system, even if the offender gets institutional violation
- E.g., "suck my dick" to a female correctional officer






#### Must meet the "Clear and Convincing Evidence" Rule

An offense is considered Truly Imminent when:

- A sex offense would have occurred as part of the same behavioral sequence but for the detection and intervention from others
- ✓ Some Parole/Probation violations can be counted as a sex offenses if offending is imminent
- ☑ Impending (minutes to hours)
  - High bar "naked wrestling game"

Grooming alone does not necessarily equate to truly imminent

## Similar Fact Crimes



An offense is considered a Similar Fact Crime when:

☑ When an offense does not have a sexual component, but based on the offender's pattern of behavior one can conclude that the offense was sexually motivated.

#### Example:

An offender is convicted of two counts of Rape 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree and one count of Assault 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree. According to the offense details, in all three situations, the offender approached an unknown female and dragged her into bushes. He sexually assaulted the first two women. In the third incident, the woman fought back and was able to escape.

It would be safe to assume that the Assault 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree was sexually motivated as it resembled his two sexual assaults so closely

### The Index Sex Offense

Manual Page 38-40

#### To be considered a SEPARATE offense:

The offender had to sexually reoffend after being detected for the previous behavior.

#### Most recent sexual offense:

- ☑ Can be an arrest, warrant issued (offender aware of), charge, conviction, parole or probation violation, or institutional rule violation
- ✓ Look for Index Clusters & Pseudo-Recidivism
- ☑ May include multiple victims in multiple jurisdictions
- ☑ Can be a Category "B" Offense if the offender has a prior Category "A" offense

### Index Sex Offense Cluster

Spree of offending at the same time or over a period of time.
Sentenced as a group at the same time in the same place

Spree of offending at the same time or over a period of time with sentencing in multiple jurisdictions and dates

#### Types of Clusters

Historical offenses detected after conviction for more recent offense (Pseudo-Recidivism)

Multiple sexual Institutional Rule Violations that occur on the same sentence collapse together as a cluster



## Item 1: Age of Release



Release refers to when the offender is first "free" in the community after the index sex offense is processed and therefore has an opportunity to reoffend.

Released

- On parole or probation
- On GPS monitoring
- Voluntary placement in treatment facility

Not Released

- In custody for Index Offense
- Involuntary committed treatment facility
- At work release

## Item 1: Age of Release Special Cases



Index Cluster: Age of release is determined by the last release date of the index cluster



Supervision Revoke: Age of release is determined by the initial release of the index sex offense



Failure to Register: Age of release is determined by the age of release on the index sex offense



New to your jurisdiction: Age of release is determined by the age of release on the index sex offense

## Charges

Parole/Probation/Community Custody Violations are typically considered charges only.

They can be considered a new conviction only if the following criteria are met:

- Offending behavior must be a criminal offense for those not under sanction
- IF there is court hearing, there needs to be a finding of guilt, and a new sanction imposed
- The sanction for the violation involved custodial time being ADDED to the offender's pre-existing sentence.

Separate violation occasions count (but multiple charges laid at same time are considered 1 charge only)

## Charges

Prison infractions can count as **charges** only.

Must meet the following criteria:

- Behavior must be sufficiently intrusive that a charge for a sex offense would be possible if not under legal sanction
- Evaluator must be sure that the sexual behavior occurred based on the Clear and Convincing Evidence threshold
- Evaluator must be clear that the institutional punishment was in response to the sexual behavior based on the Clear and Convincing Evidence threshold

One charge per term, even if multiple instances

### The Index Sex Offense

To be considered a SEPARATE offense: The offender had to sexually reoffend after being detected for the previous behavior.

#### Most recent sexual offense:

- ☑ Can be an arrest, charge, conviction, parole or probation violation, or institutional rule violation
- ✓ Look for Index Clusters & Pseudo-Recidivism
- ☑ May include multiple victims in multiple jurisdictions
- ☑ Can be a Category "B" Offense if the offender has a prior Category "A" offense

### **Index Sex Offense Cluster**

Spree of offending at the same time or over a period of time.
Sentenced as a group at the same time in the same place

Spree of offending at the same time or over a period of time with sentencing in multiple jurisdictions and dates

### Types of Clusters

Historical offenses detected after conviction for more recent offense (Pseudo-Recidivism)

Multiple sexual Institutional Rule Violations that occur on the same sentence collapse together as a cluster

### **Index Offense**

When determining the index offense, identify three important dates for all sex offense(s):

- ✓ The last date of sexual offending
- ✓ The first date of detection
- ✓ The last date of the criminal justice process

James Smith sexually offends between 1976 and 1979. He commits a sexual offense in 1992 and is detected and sentenced in 1995. In 2002 he is charged and sentenced for the offenses in the 1970s.

### The Index Sex Offense

Richard Jones sexually offends between 1976 and 1979. He commits a sexual offense in 1988 and is arrested and sentenced for that offense in 1989. Due to publicity for this offense, his victims from the 1970s come forward and he is convicted and sentenced for the 2002 offense as well as the historical offenses from the 1970s.



Identify if there are any remaining offenses that meet one of the following three criteria:

- The offense behavior and sentence occurred in GAP 2
- The sentence occurred in GAP 2, but the offense behavior occurred prior to GAP 2
- The sentence occurred after GAP 2, but the offense behavior occurred in or prior to GAP 2

All offenses that meet at least one of the above criteria are considered part of the index sex offense cluster. All other remaining criminal history would be considered priors.

### Items 3 and 4 "Double Dipping Rule"

If the behavior was sexual but the offender was convicted of non-sexual violence, the same conviction counts as both a sexual offense and non-sexual violence offense, examples:

- Murder
- Kidnapping
- Battery
- Assault





### Item 5: Prior Sex Offenses Juvenile Sex Offenses

Sexual behaviors occurring at age 11 or younger

 These crimes are not counted as priors even if found criminally responsible

Crimes committed by juveniles between 12 and 17 and are processed through the social service system

- Age 12 to 15: Placement/transfer to a secure setting counts as 1 charge, only 1 charge in this time period even if multiple moves
- 16 and older: Each time is counted as a separate charge

## Item #6 Prior Sentencing Occasions



Must meet the Static 99R definition of a conviction



To count as a distinct sentencing occasion, the individual must re-offend after being sanctioned for a previous offense



Can count both prior sex offense convictions and non-sex related convictions



Only tally offenses that have been identified as priors, do not count index or post-index offenses

### Item 6: Prior Sentencing Occasions

#### Step 1

- Sort criminal history and identify prior convictions
- Sort priors convictions by sentencing date

#### Step 2

- Working from the earliest sentencing date, review offense dates that occurred prior to that sentencing date
- All offense dates that occurred prior to that sentencing date create one distinct sentencing occasion

#### Step 3

- Locate the next available sentencing date
- Determine what remaining convictions occurred prior to that sentencing date
- All offenses that occurred prior will create the next distinct sentencing occasion

#### Step 4

- Perform the previous step for the remaining convictions identified as priors.
- Continue until you have four distinct sentencing occasions or you have reviewed all convictions labeled as priors

## Item 7: Non-Contact Sex Offenses





Must meet the Static 99R definition of a conviction



The offense can either be part of the index sex offense or a prior sex offense



The behavior determines if it counts as a non-contact sex offense, not the name of the criminal conviction



The conviction must address only the non-contact sex offense behavior

A non-contact sex offense is any illegal sexual act where the offender did not touch the victim and either:



The victim was not coerced into anything beyond perceiving the offense

#### OR



No attempt was made by the offender to make the victim aware that they were being victimized

#### Considered Non-Contact Sex Offenses:



- Obscene Telephone Calls
  - Voyeurism
  - Theft of Underwear
  - Urinating in Public
- Sexual Talk over the Internet
- Viewing child pornography online

#### Considered Contact Sex Offenses:

- Compelling the commission of a sex offense
  - Positioning someone to watch a sex offense
    - Coerce/threaten a victim to engage in sexual acts
    - Manipulate a child under 16 to engage in sexual acts
    - Creating or directing child pornography
  - Trying to meet a child for sex
- Paying to view a child being sexually abused live or content to be created

#### Do not include:



Prison infractions

Community Custody Violations

Prostitution related offenses

Contact sex offenses pled down to a non-contact sex offense

Attempted contact sex offenses

Convictions that include both contact and non-contact behaviors

On 8/1/97, Mr. Smith sexually assaulted a 14 year old female. When his belongings were searched, nude pictures of the victim were found. Mr. Smith was charged and convicted of sexual assault.

#### **Stranger Victims**



- Sex offense happens within the first 24 hours of "knowing" each other. "Knowing" does need to involve some interaction
- Internet offenses, the sexual offense (lewd pictures/talk) occurs within the first 24 hours of chatting
- Internet offenses, the offender completely mispresents themselves by age and/or gender
- Sexually offends a family member within the first 24 hours of meeting each other

#### **Known Victims**



- Sex offense happens 24 hours after first knowing each other. Knowing each other requires a slight degree of interaction. They have had to say "hi" to each other, but do not need to know their name or other personal information
- Internet offenses, if the sexual offense happens after 24 hours of first speaking to each other (email, chats)

2014 - Mr. Smith was spending the day at a local neighborhood park. He saw a girl he had met from the neighborhood go over to the restrooms. Mr. Smith followed her into the restroom. When she exited the stall, Mr. Smith had his pants down and exposed his penis to her. Mr. Smith acted like he was in the wrong restroom and apologized. Law enforcement was contacted and Mr. Smith was eventually arrested after admitting he purposefully exposed himself to the victim. When the victim was interviewed, she did not know Mr. Smith by name. She reported that she had seen him at the park before and had previously petted his dog.

### Item 10: Male Victim



#### Male Victim

- Category A offenses (child pornography where the offender created it with a real live male child)
- Sting Operations, if the offender believes he is talking to or meeting up with a male victim
- Clear evidence of targeting a male in a mixed gender group
- Forces a male to watch a sexual assault if it is part of his sexual fantasy/sexual motivation



#### Not a Male Victim

- Category B offenses (child pornography depicting males)
- Exposure and voyeurism against a mixed gender group, no indication he was targeting the males in the group
- Assaults/confines a male in order to access the female victim

#### Item 10: Male Victim

2014 - Mr. Smith sexually assaulted his niece, Susan. Susan reported the behavior and Mr. Smith was eventually arrested. He participated in a Psychosexual Evaluation for SSOSA consideration. As part of the evaluation, he underwent a polygraph examination. In the pre-test interview, Mr. Smith admitted touching a boy when he was a camp counselor. Mr. Smith was sentenced under SSOSA. During his treatment sessions he again reported the male victim and also reported the male victim in future disclosure statements. Mr. Smith never provided additional information about the identity of the male victim.


#### Item 10: Male Victim

2014 - Mr. Smith broke into a residence and sexually assaulted an unknown woman. While the assault occurred, the woman yelled out for help. On three occasions, the victim's young son walked into the room and witnessed his mom being sexually assaulted. In each incident, Mr. Smith yelled at the boy to leave the room. Eventually Mr. Smith grabbed the boy and locked him in the bathroom. Law enforcement later interviewed the boy, who reported seeing Mr. Smith and was frightened by the experience.

Percentile ranks describe the offender's risk in comparison to other sexual offenders. Because some offenders have the same scores, there are different ways of reporting percentile ranks (% higher, % lower, mid-point average). Absolute recidivism rates cannot be inferred from percentile rankings.

Mr. XX's Static-99R score was 0. In routine correctional samples, this score represents the 19<sup>th</sup> percentile, defined as a mid-point average (14% have a lower score, 76% have a higher score, and 10% have the same score). In other words, out of 100 sexual offenders, 14 would have a lower score, 10 would have the same score, and 76 would have a higher score. With the 95% confidence interval, the score could span the 13<sup>th</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> percentile.

Note: Risk ratios were calculated from hazard ratios based on Cox regression coefficients derived from entering the continuous (i.e., unclumped) Static-99R scores ( $\beta$  = 0.332; SE = .022), with sample as strata (k = 8, n = 4,037). Due to small sample size, risk ratios are not presented for Static-99R scores greater than 8. The analyses were based on routine (i.e., relatively unselected) correctional samples.

Risk ratios describe differences between recidivism rates. For Static-99R, risk ratios compare the expected recidivism rate for offenders with a particular score, to the expected recidivism rate of offenders in the middle of the risk distribution. The middle of the risk distribution is defined as the rate for offenders having the median score (2). Risk ratios for Static-99R are reasonably stable across followup times and jurisdictions.


#### High Risk/Need

When selecting the correct group consider:

- ✓ Observable levels of dynamic needs
- External risk factors that are relatively enduring psychological risk factors

### Recommendations for Selecting the Correct Group



When using only the Static 99R, typically use the routine group

Acknowledge the recidivism rates may be higher or lower based on external risk factors

The routine group included offender with exceptionally high external risk factors

Mr. XX's Static-99R score was 6. In routine samples with the same score, the 5 year sexual recidivism rate is between 18% and 23%. This means that out of 100 sexual offenders with the same risk score between 18 and 23 would be charged or convicted of a new sexual offence after 5 years in the community. Conversely, between 77 and 82 would not be charged or convicted of a new sexual offence during that time period.

Static-99R does not measure all relevant risk factors and Mr. XXXX's recidivism risk may be higher or lower than that indicated by Static-99R based on factors not included in this risk tool.
